MOZAMBIQUE

I.INTRODUCTION

The newsletter of the Girls Friendly Society (GFS) for the period from January to February 2021, reports on the activities carried out in the period in question.

Due to the Covid 19 pandemic that is plaguing our country and the world in general, we have used the new Information Communication Technologies (ICTs) for carrying out activities.

II. ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT

From January to February 2021, GFS in the Diocese of Lebombos, carried out the following activities:

Communication with members maintained through a WhatsApp group created where all GFS Coordinators in the Diocese of Lebombos belong.

Through the WhatsApp platform, prayers were offered to patients and their families infected by Covid 19, where the prayer program was previously shared, with specific activities for the GFS Chaplain, the Diocesan Coordinator, the program moderator and members who voluntarily choose the activity to be carried out in the program.

It is important to note that prayers were offered for priests and their relatives infected by Covid 19. Point out that before the scheduled time for prayers, the sick priest and his wife are added to the GFS WhatsApp group on behalf of the family participate in prayers and at the end be able to say a few words. It is important to note that in one of the prayer programs carried out, we had the privilege of the participation of His Most Reverend Bishop of Lembos who was added to the group before the beginning of the prayers.

Prayers were also offered in the same way to GFS members and their families for the loss of their loved ones.

Regarding Sunday Masses, Parishes via the WhatsApp platform have been sharing the audios with the contents of the liturgy of the day and others realize masses online using the Zoom platform.

III. CHALLENGES

Due to the Covid 19 pandemic, the State of Emergency was decreed by His Excellence the President of the Republic of Mozambique, where some measures were taken, including the closing of the churches.

IV. EFFECTS OF CYCLONE ELOISE IN MOZAMBICAN



General picture

Across Southern Africa, the Eloise weather system has left at least 15 people dead, including 7 in Mozambique, 3 in Zimbabwe,2 in Eswatini, 2 in South Africa, and 1 in Madagascar







Nearly 250,000 people have been affected, and nearly 17,000 houses impacted, by Tropical Cyclone Eloise in Mozambique, according to the latest figures from the Government.



In Mozambique, where Tropical Cyclone Eloise made landfall on 23 January, flooding is still affecting the central region of

the country, especially Buzi District, in Sofala Province, where about 100km2 of land appears to be flooded, based on the latest analysis from UNOSAT/UNITAR. Eloise has affected at least 248,481 people, including 16,693 displaced, according to latest data from the National Institute for Disaster Management and Risk Reduction (INGD), as of 25 January. Thirty-three accommodation centres have been activated in impacted areas, with 31 centres in Sofala Province accommodating 15,510 people and 2 centres in Manica Province accommodating 1,183 people. At least 16,967 houses have been destroyed, damaged or flooded, mainly in Sofala Province, and over 411 classrooms and at least 74 health centres will need repairs. Some

humanitarian facilities, including one WFP Warehouse were also damaged. However, WFP's emergency stocks are safe and will be distributed to affected communities. More than 142,189 hectares of crops (including maize, rice, cassava and others) have been flooded in central Mozambique, which could impact the next harvest in April and the ability of affected families to meet their food needs in the period ahead. AUSTRALIA

GFS Australia has been amazingly active despite Covid in 2020. Many Children's/Kids Plus groups found it difficult to meet but adult members were active in prayer, keeping in touch with their young members and continuing with other ministries.

Ballarat Diocese donated, amongst many items, 73 rugs and 68 jumpers for children. Brisbane Diocese continued to support Ichthus Camps for children and youth and a Chaplain in the Royal Children's Hospital with grants given for Children's activities in parishes. St Alford's, Melbourne kept in touch with young members and a Liaison Officer was supported and funded for Melbourne Diocese. North Queensland plans to re-start children's ministries and groups in 2021 and has an active adult membership. Perth held successful Holiday Clubs for children and continued to keep in contact with women via Facebook and other ways electronically. We pray about the future of GFS in South Australia.

Sydney Diocese has many school age -groups and Kids Clubs and Playtime groups and we give thanks for them. Prayer meetings were held on Zoom during 2021. Lyn Vaak, Chairman of GFS Sydney and Vice-President of GFS Australia, who has passed away, was honoured posthumously in the Queen's Birthday Honours list with a Medal of the Order of Australia for

service to many women and young girls in the Sydney Diocese. Congratulations for her life of service.

Southern Beaches, Parish in Tasmania, has a thriving Kids Plus group. Also, there are wonderful Kids Plus groups in Brisbane and Bundaberg (Brisbane Diocese).

GFS Australia continues to support GFS in the Dioceses of Popondota and Port Moresby including the Feeding Program in Port Moresby city. In addition, 214 new members were welcomed in Melanesia with new GFS badges given by GFS Australia (Solomon Islands).



Finally, I have been a member of GFS for over 20 years and led our GFS Group/Kids Plus at the Kenmore Church of the Holy Spirit for 16 years with other leaders. My leadership of our GFS Group for girls started in 1997 and morphed into Kids Plus for boys and girls, which

closed in 2015. I attended GFS Brisbane meetings to assist with the Brisbane GFS Branch and helped organise church services. Currently, we package donated toiletries for our Home Away from Homelessness and other Anglican Church homes.

Diocese of Hanuato

The Mothers Union and GFS Members in the Dioceses of Hanuato held a one week program in September 2020 at Kirakira town, opening with a parade. Most of the live skill activities were carried out during the day while bible studies, bible hunting, singing and prayers were conducted at night times.

The program covered a lot of topics as follows; Parading on the opening day Bible studies/bible hunting and singings Life skills, crocheting, sewing machine repairs, floral arrangements, traditional mat weavings and making concrete bricks.

GFS teachings

The program ended on the 26th September 2020 with the admission of new members, both girls and boys. The program was well attended by the different Anglican parishes throughout Hanuato Diocese and supported by the church Leaders and supporters in the Diocese.

The program was organized by the Diocesan MU President and the GFS Coordinator mostly through fund raising activities with some support by the PMU Office.

The DMU President had express her gratitude for the support rendered by the Diocese, the surrounding communities' leaders and members of MU and GFS in the Diocese.

We are thankful for the ability to use online media, post, craft packs etc to allow us to stay connected.

SRI LANKA

Background

We were active in the last quarter of 2019 and had big plans for 2020, but sadly Covid-19 got in the way. The country was locked down for several months, twice, and programmes could not be conducted in the traditional manner. All seemed lost, but we took a different approach, changed our strategy and used modern technology to keep the Society running, the staff occupied and the public aware of our activities.

When the country was opened, safety health regulations were observed and staff began attending office on roster basis. However, due to restrictions, our GFS is still not fully operational.

A new way

The smart phone became the device of the moment. WhatsApp was the most accessible and cost-effective method of communication, especially in the outstations. Zoom could not be used in most areas due to limited access to internet and digital resources. Thus, we formed WhatsApp groups island wide to hold





members together and initiated novel prc GFS Comm keep them busy and interested.

The GFS continues to produce and share the following with these groups:

Weekly short videos - Sermons, Worship, Bible Studies and "How to make" (craft items, paint, cook etc).

Special videos - Breast Cancer, Orange Day, Pollution, Christmas Carols.

Monthly Quizzes.

Weekly basic English Class "Step by Step".

At our request, members sent in short videos of their hobbies, home gardens etc. recorded on their mobile phones. They were also given opportunities to conduct weekly Bible studies.

Weekly online English Class via Zoom began this year to assist members of the Deniyaya branch.

GFS Community Project: Women helping Women Women faced pay cuts and some lost their jobs due to the pandemic, resulting in hardship for them and their families. A community project was initiated to assist such women especially in rural areas to market homegrown fresh produce, home-made pickles, preserves and sweetmeats and handmade items, to the city consumer at low cost. GFS members living in the outstations who faced financial problems due to the pandemic were also able to earn additional income.



A small, smart Sales Outlet was built in our premises for this Project.

We participated in GFS World zoom meetings. At WDP Service, one lesson was read by a member representing Asia.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, our 97-year-old Hall cannot be used for programs or hired out for events.

We have been so impressed with the many virtual groups that have taken place online using Zoom. These have been every week to ensure girls had GFS in their lives which has been vital when they were not attending school or other social activities. In that time, we have had such important conversations with them about their wellbeing and mental health.

It has also been so encouraging to see group leaders and volunteers invest time in driving to deliver care packages and activity packs for the girls so that they knew GFS was thinking about them and that we cared for their happiness.

We launched a further Big Dreamers Club which is a virtual online program designed to inspire and empower girls who attend. This new launch has seen girls attend and add themselves to our growing waiting list from different parts of England and Wales.

Alongside this work we have been looking at how we can develop our infrastructure for the groups and offer them as much support as possible for when we go back to face to face groups, which we hope will be after Easter. We are excited to see this happen and will be making sure our priority is to support groups and celebrate their return for girls.

The charity is saddened to lose our Chair Iana Vidal who after six years of leading our governance is stepping down in line with our Articles. She has done a great





deal to help us bridge into the future and think about the long-term sustainability of the charity. We are delighted to welcome her successor Leanne Massey who has volunteered for GFS and whose daughter attends one of our groups.

Together, the Board, Volunteers, Staff team and most importantly the girls will be celebrating International Women's Day on 8th March to support the theme #ChooseToChallenge. We will all be naming how we personally choose to challenge gender inequality so that girls and young women have improved choices for their future.


